As kids, we rushed home from school during the Summer June Royal Ascot week and went to collect the "Corona" and "Tizer" bottles left by the chainlink fencing alongside the Racecourse and the Totalisator cages in the middle of the racecourse. We often struggled with 2-3 bags full of bottles.

That was when we had 240 pence to £1 and "30 bob" was thirty shillings - equivalent to £1-50 today.

#### Anosognosia

In the following analysis, the French Professor Bruno Dubois Director of the Institute of Memory and Alzheimer's Disease (IMMA) at La Pitié-Salpêtrière, Paris Hospitals, addresses the subject in a rather reassuring way:

"If anyone is aware of his memory problems, he does not have Alzheimer's."

- 1. I forget the names of families
- 2. I do not remember where I put some things
- It often happens in people 60 years and older that they complain that they lack memory.
- "The information is always in the brain, it is the "processor" that is lacking."

This is "Anosognosia" or temporary forgetfulness.

Half of people 60 and older have some symptoms that are due to age rather than disease. The most common cases are:

- forgetting the name of a person,
- going to a room in the house and not remembering why we were going there,
- a blank memory for a movie title or actor, an actress,
- a waste of time searching where we left our glasses or keys
- After 60 years most people have such a difficulty, which indicates that it is not a disease but rather a characteristic due to the passage of years ...
- Many people are concerned about these oversights hence the importance of the following statement:
- "Those who are conscious of being forgetful have no serious problem of memory. Those who suffer from a memory illness or Alzheimer's, are not aware of what is happening."
- Professor Bruno Dubois, Director of IMMA, reassures the majority of people concerned about their oversights:
- "The more we complain about memory loss, the less likely we are to suffer from memory sickness."

Now for a little neurological test:

Only use your eyes!

1- Find the C in the table below!

2- If you have already found the C, then find the 6 in the table below.

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3- Now find the N in the table below. Attention, it's a little more difficult!

If you pass these three tests without too many problems:

- you can cancel your annual visit to the neurologist.
- your brain is in perfect shape!
- you are far from having any relationship with Alzheimer's.

#### **Growing Concerns**

The festive season is over, a new year has begun and there is a glimmer of hope that we might begin Square Dancing before the end of the year.

I recently unpacked my dancing clothes to check for moth damage. On trying them on it became clear that during the lockdown and over Christmas I have put on a pound or two. I have resolved to eat a little more healthily. At lunch I make sure that I add some lettuce or tomatoes to my baked potato and chips and use low fat spread on a slice of bread rather than using butter.

He asked for an example of a call. My mind went blank. I said that I couldn't immediately recall any names but an example of steps might be something like 'left foot in, left foot out, in-out, in-out, shake it all about'. I realised afterwards that I need to do some revision. I haven't actually started revising yet because a thought struck me.

Many schoolchildren will be sitting their exams next year. As they have missed much of their schooling because of Covid, then, despite the lip-service that they really should cover the whole syllabus, they will actually be told what particular subjects will appear in the exam questions. In the same way I wondered whether, to be fair, callers should give us a heads-up as to what particular calls they intend to use, at least for the first few weeks?

I will have to sign off now as the microwave has just 'dinged' indicating that my lunch is ready. I am trying vegetarian. I think the recipe came from some people called the 'Beery Hikers'. It is a shortcrust pastie that doesn't have any meat. It is just filled with potato and baked beans and it is served with hash browns and fried onion rings.

# **Caller's Corner**

# Asymmetrical Choreography, what is it - and - is it useful, in any way?

One of the first things that a Caller learns are the five conditions of symmetry; the vast majority of Square Dance choreography that a Caller uses, will be "symmetrical" - every Call affects 2, 4, 6 or 8 people - there will be a "symmetrically corresponding Dancer" to be found - by drawing a line, from any Dancer, through the centre of the square. When this is not the case, we use the term "Asymmetrical" to describe what has happened.

Asymmetrical Calling can be deliberately established by the Caller to create an unusual situation; for example: to have four Boys in one Ocean Wave and four Girls in the other (but keep everybody In Sequence) - you need only Call: Couples 1 and 2 Half Sashay, Sides Lead Right, Touch a Quarter; this can be a very powerful gimmick device and can help with training in certain types of Calls - i.e. the Calls that are not dependent upon the interaction between a Boy and a Girl. Alternatively, you can target the Sequence by Calling something like: Couples 1 & 2 Right and Left Thru (or 3 & 4 Flutterwheel). You will then need to know how to resolve back to a Symmetrical condition and if you can do that by using regular choreography, without too many "special (directional) Calls", it will be very impressive. Acquiring this knowledge is not difficult but it does take work.

However, the most common occurrence of an Asymmetrical situation will result from a mistake made on the floor - and - all of a sudden - you discover something completely wrong with the square; for example: 3 Boys in one wave and 3 Girls in the other - or 1 Couple facing out while the other 3 are facing in - or 2 Head men on the same side of a Line of Four, or any other situation where you cannot prove symmetry by 5 conditions. If you have several squares on the floor, then the probability is that any Asymmetrical elements will appear only in 1 square (or possibly a few squares), if the Caller sees this, it is possible to continue moving all of the Dancers, in an effective manner and recover the oddball aspects of the Asymmetric squares, by avoiding sex-dependent Calls (or - if the Sequence is wrong - "Get-Out" Calls). Once every square appears Symmetrical - at least in terms of Formation and Arrangement - the Caller can attempt to resolve all the Dancers to a correct Get-Out (unless the true Sequence needs to restored, when it may be necessary to make use of one of the many special types of "Gimmick Call" to fix it).

Understanding Asymmetrical choreography is quite complicated - requiring an extensive knowledge of the individual Calls. However, it is possible to correct most Asymmetrical situations provided that the Dancers continue to dance. I use Asymmetrical resolutions, at my club nights, if one Square "goes wrong"; I usually point out the problem e.g. "two Side Couples together", it is great fun, for all concerned and - from the Dancers point of view - it appears to be quite fantastic and therefore "adds" to the "magic" of the Calls!

Deliberate asymmetrical routines are many in number and all of these will be interesting to the Dancers. It is important that all Callers learn about Asymmetrical choreography and practice it with the Dancers regularly; as a Dancer it might be fun to ask your Caller to show you some of the Asymmetrical ideas and choreography they have researched.

#### Dive Bar ~ Doug McCart

Solid Gold SG 1035 (Original Artists: Garth Brooks and Blake Shelton)

From Garth Brooks' 2020 album: "Fun" - this is the third single and was pre-released in July 2019. The album's full release was postponed due to production delays - resulting from the Covid-19 pandemic. Garth Brooks, Bryan Kennedy and Mitch Rossell wrote the song; Garth Brooks undertook the "Dive Bar Tour" playing at seven U.S. "Dive Bars" to promote the single. This version offers a very well produced instrumental - and vocal!

**Mainstream Figure:** Heads Promenade Halfway, Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru, Pass Thru, Trade By, Touch a Quarter, Scootback X 2, Swing.

**Kick up your Heels** ~ **Duke Okada, Mitchell Osawa, Kumi Takahashi** Riverboat RIV 1102 (Original Artists: Unknown)

This is a great tune and the version presented here features some excellent music, with Harmonica, Piano, Guitar and a great "fast-feeling" Rhythm Track - all played in a Cajun style. I have no idea where this song originated; it is either a tune written specially for Square Dancing, or one that is known better by a different name that I have not been able to find! It features three Callers from Japan, who do a terrific job on the vocals!

**Mainstream Figure:** Heads Promenade Halfway, Sides Square Thru Four Right and Left Thru, Eight Chain Six, Swing and Promenade.

#### Rocket Man ~ Chris Froggatt

Knee Deep KDM 139 (Original Artist: Elton John)

The full title for the track is: "Rocket Man (I Think It's Going to Be a Long, Long Time"); this is a song composed by Elton John and Bernie Taupin, performed by Elton John that first appeared as the lead single on his 1972 album: "Honky Château". Chris Froggatt has done a first class job "re-creating" this as a Square Dance (it needed a fair amount of "re-thinking", in musical terms), this version is great - and Chris excels on the vocal!

**Mainstream Choreography:** Heads Square Thru Four, Right Hand Star Heads Star Left, Do Sa Do, Swing Thru, Boys Trade, Swing and Promenade.

#### What I Didn't Get for Christmas ~ Chuck Simpkins

R & D Recordings R&D 1026 (Original Artist: Jimmy Buffett)

"Tis the SeaSon", released in 2016, was the second Christmas album by Jimmy Buffett; it is his twenty-ninth studio album and included this track, written by Mac Mcanally (who is a member of Jimmy Buffett's backing band: "The Coral Reefer Band"). This uses the "Rolling Country" feel and presents Trumpet as part of the instrumentation, which keeps it close to the original. Chuck has done a fantastic job with a Jimmy Buffett style Vocal!

**Mainstream Choreography:** Heads Square Thru Four Hands, Do Sa Do Swing Thru, Spin the Top Right and Left Thru, Square Thru Three, Swing.

#### Slow Dance ~ Jimmy MacDonald

Lou-Mac LM 321 (Original Writer: David Weatherford)

This is a nice song, with a beautiful sentiment, based on a poem that was written by a Child Psychologist: David Weatherford. Unfortunately, I was not able to track down an original tune recording; the lyrics include: "You better slow down, don't dance so fast, time is short, the music won't last", it works really well as a generic "listen to the music, stop and smell the roses while you can", type song; with a good well presented vocal!

**Mainstream Choreography:** Heads Promenade Halfway, Square Thru Four Right and Left Thru, Veer Left, Ferris Wheel, Square Thru Three, Swing.

#### Down at the Lah De Dah ~ Corben Geis

Silver Sounds SSR 405 (Original Artist: Jimmy Buffett)

Another Jimmy Buffett song; this one is taken from "Life on the Flip Side" - his thirtieth album, released in 2020 and is written by Jimmy Buffett, Paul Brady and Ralph Murphy, it is the very first track on the album and tells about the "Lah De Dah", a place that you may like to go; perhaps the clue is it rhymes with "Bar"? A slower feeling "Island song", offered with (or without a chorus); impresario Corben Geis "glides" through the vocal!

**Mainstream Figure:** Promenade Half, Pass the Ocean, Extend, Swing Thru Boys Run, Bend the Line, Right and Left Thru, Two Ladies Chain, Promenade.

#### **UNDERSTANDING CAST OFF 3/4**

Everyone knows how to do the combination of: Centers In - Cast Off 3/4. But how many dancers can do only the Cast Off 3/4 without the preceding Centers In? It is surprising the number who can not do this.

Near the end of many of my Mainstream and Plus dances I will put the dancers in lines facing out and call: " Cast Off 3/4." The correct ending formation is lines facing in, but it is surprising the number of dancers who finish in



lines facing out. Many of them are already leaning in anticipation of doing a Wheel & Deal, so they just move in that direction.

I joke with the crowd and make a fun thing out of it, but it is amazing the number of people who approach me later and say: "How do you do Cast Off 3/4 from lines?" Here is the amazingly simple answer.

From any line of 4, which can mean all dancers facing one way, two-faced lines, 3&1 lines or waves. CENTERS WALK FORWARD.

That's it. Remember that rule and you will not break down.

The European report included the following (from the EAASDC):
