Royal RYL 632 (Original Artist: Kris Kristofferson)

A country music ballad - originally written and composed by Kris Kristofferson - that was released on his 1970 album "Kristofferson"; winning him a Grammy Award. However, it was female vocalist Sammi Smith's cover, released later in the same year that became the most successful version of the song. Royal Records offer a first-rate, faster feeling version with fantastic instrumentation, powered by the irrepressible voice of Jerry Story!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Promenade Halfway, Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru, Veer Left, Couples Circulate, Half Tag, Scootback X 2, Swing.

Don't Let the Sun Go Down On Me ~ Jake Shimada

Rhythm International RI 950 (Original Artist: Elton John)

A 1974 song, written by English singer Elton John and his lyricist Bernie Taupin - it was released as a single from the album "Caribou". The song found further success in 1991 when released as a duet by Elton John and George Michael, which had been recorded at the "Live Aid" concert in Wembley Stadium in 1985. Top instrumental from Rhythm - as you would expect - with Jake Shimada from Japan, doing a terrific job on the vocals!

Mainstream Choreography: Heads Promenade Halfway, Square Thru Four Right and Left Thru, Veer Left, Ferris Wheel, Square Thru Three and Swing.

Love You Too Much ~ Gene Turner

Shindig SP 1159 (Original Artist: Brady Seals)

A track from the second album by Brady Seals, named: "Brady Seals" and released in 1998. It tells the story of a young man, so in love with his girl that - no matter what she does or how she treats him - he can't think straight! This is a great song offering a marvellous melody that has been beautifully recreated by Shindig (from South Africa); it also features our own Gene Turner on the vocal, who makes excellent use of the music!

Mainstream Figure: Promenade Half, Pass the Ocean, Extend, Swing Thru Boys Run, Bend the Line, Right and Left Thru, Pass the Ocean, Recycle.

Eighteen Wheels and a Dozen Roses ~ Tac Ozaki

Riverboat RIV 1106 (Original Artist: Kathy Mattea)

American country music artist Kathy Mattea recorded and released this song in 1988 as the second single from her album "Untasted Honey"; it was written by Paul Nelson and Gene Nelson. The lyrics tell the story of a truck driver named "Charlie" - who is retiring after thirty years - to spend more time with his wife. It is an up-tempo piece of music, which keeps it close to the original; Tac Ozaki has done a fantastic job with the Vocal!

Falling Feels Like Flying ~ Charlie Robertson

Lou-Mac LM 309 (Original Artist: Jeff Bridges)

The correct title for this song is: "Fallin' and Flyin'". Lloyd Bridges performed this song, written by Stephen Bruton and Gary Nicholson, for his Academy Award-winning role as Otis "Bad" Blake in the movie Crazy Heart (2009). The film soundtrack features a solo version from Bridges and a duet with Colin Farrell, who performed the song with him at the end of the movie. Great Harmonica, a full sound, a strong beat, with a good vocal!

BREXIT CAN BE FUN! (Pt II)

Last month I promised to let you in on the definition of my Call of 'Brexit' which I 'invented' to use in a Singing Call to the tune 'Ode to Joy'. This was to

mark the UK finally leaving the EU. My approach to its construction was to try and be symbolic of that enormous change in the political and commercial life of the country; and to Keep It Simple (something for which I am not always known!).

You may remember that BBC News had a Brexit 'logo' consisting of a star from the EU flag but with one Union-flag-coloured arm moving away from it. I constructed 'Brexit' by starting with Normal Facing Couples in a Box. At the Call of 'Brexit', all four make a Star (Right-handed of course because that is the default) around to their diagonally opposite position and face out. Simple, and with the symbolism of turning one's back on the star (the EU).

As I said previously, I would be most surprised if Brexit is a new Call. Unfortunately the Encyclopedia of All Possible Calls is only available in hard-copy form, and so it is not easy to search to confirm (or deny) the pre-existence of this Call. If it exists it will definitely have a different name. If anyone comes across it, I would be very interested to know what you find – please. (h.k.nichols@btinternet.com)

Given that Brexit starts with a Right-hand Star, there is clearly a 'Left Brexit' which produces the same end result but can help with body flow. (Perhaps this might have been the default definition if it had been the Labour Party who had taken us out of the EU!)

'Brexit' is quite versatile, e.g. from a Box of Normal Facing Couples the effect of 'Ladies Brexit' is obvious. Starting from Normal Facing Lines, 'Ladies Brexit' and 'All 4 Ladies Brexit' are possible like 'Ladies Chain' and 'All 4 Ladies Chain'; 'Men' could be substituted for 'Ladies' in all of those cases; and so on and so on.

Rabbie Burns said "The best laid schemes o' mice an' men go aft a-gley". The New Year Party at which I planned to use the Brexit Call did not take place. However, just as in Square Dancing we sometimes have 'Christmas in July', I might forgo chronological relevance; so if you are in a Square, and you hear 'Ode to Joy' when I am about to Call for you, then you just might find that Brexit can be fun.

SECRET HINTS TO KEEP FROM BREAKING DOWN

(1) Always have your set lined up with the walls. The human race is straight-line oriented, and most square dance calls end in parallel formations. It is much easier to see formations if the set is parallel with the walls in the hall, instead of at an angle.



Often a set will become slightly offset from being lined up with walls as a result of doing a series of

calls. Then a Cast Off or other turning motion call may cause some people to become disoriented and break down on a call they would normally do well. Also, if the caller says to Promenade and then has the heads or sides Wheel Around, it is almost certain that the set will not be lined up with walls.

Solution: Take it upon yourself to make slight adjustments on the next one or two calls to get the set aligned with walls. One person can cause the whole set to adjust, so you be that person. How do you do this? An example might be to overdo the Courtesy Turn on a Right & Left Thru to add a few degrees, or you could do slightly less than a full Courtesy Turn on the call. Another example might be to do Touch 1/4 slightly more or less. An easy way is just to adjust yourself and partner in facing lines, because the others will usually go along, especially if they have been trained to take hands.

An obvious sign of good dancers is that they make an adjustment to become lined up with walls any time the set is not this way. When I call and I see dancers making an adjustment to line up with the walls, I know these are the stronger dancers and will watch them the rest of the dance.

Unfortunately, many dancers have never been told the importance of being lined up with walls. If this idea was taught in beginners class, there would be far fewer breakdowns all along the way.

(2) When the caller says "Promenade, don't slow down," whisper to your partner whether you are heads of sides. This is primarily the

boy's responsibility, because at Mainstream and Plus the girls assumes the identity of the boy with whom she is dancing.

Why the whisper? Because you know that 99% of the time the next call will be "Heads (or sides) Wheel Around." If you do not know what you are, you will be slow in reacting to the call, which could result in the square breaking down on the next call because you are not in position to do it. I see these breakdowns happen all the time, and they could be eliminated simply by being prepared when you know the caller is going to say for someone to Wheel Around. Also, if you know whether you are a head or side and you are NOT told to Wheel Around, then you will be ready to tell the couple in front of you to do the call if they are slow in reacting.

Caller's Corner

How it all started - My first attempt at creating a course for Training Callers

In the mid 1980s, Dave Whittington and I (President and Vice President) were given the task to continue Caller Training after Pete Skiffins (Training Director), asked Callers Club Council for a "sabbatical" from the role. Pete had been teaching new Callers, at each of the six bi-monthly Caller Club meetings, by using a separate classroom at Bounds Green School. Pete's sessions ran parallel to the main meeting, where presentations of more general items were provided (quite often by Dave and I). As Dave and I could not be in two places at the same time - we had to find 6 more Sundays, when we were available, when the Caller Training could take place; logically these should be as close as possible to the second Sunday of each of the months when there was no Callers Club meeting... Looking at our calendars, we found 6 Sunday's that came close to fitting this pattern!

I put together a Curriculum for the school - based on the newly released CALLERLAB Curriculum (this was the initial 62 page document, which simply contained a few pages on each topic, as well as several pages on the general format for a 5-day School). It was relatively simple to modify this to fit the 6 Sunday School-Days; NB - if you obtain a copy of the CALLERLAB Curriculum today it comprises the original document, as well as the "Technical Supplement" (a further 172 pages of text). However, I had to create my own supplement, from the just released: "Sets in Order American Square Dance Society Caller Text" - a large 638 page book that collected all the "Caller Text" articles published over 37 years (444 issues) in their magazines. I purchased a copy and began reading...

To obtain all the information that was mentioned in the CALLERLAB Curriculum, I had to read this book through twice; first to familiarise myself with the content and the second time to make detailed notes - and add "Post-it" tags to various chapters. Based on this research, I wrote a "6-Sunday School Curriculum" - and put together handouts for each session as an aide-memoire for the Callers - to help them remember the topics covered.

The training sessions were held at a Northolt Community Centre - from 10:00 a.m. until 5 p.m. - with a 1-hour lunch break (which was very much a "working lunch" situation). We were pleased to see that Callers from all over the UK joined us, many of whom were very experienced. Dave and I shared the presentations and provided examples - both as a rhetorical device, based upon our own experiences - and by using Dancers, invited to join us in the afternoon. We utilised a "lecture" format - and encouraged questions; this format was extremely successful - and led to a second year run along similar lines. Many years ago, Callers Club stopped holding bi-monthly National meetings, effectively removing the opportunity for any National Experienced Caller Training in the UK. The idea had been to replace the six bi-monthly meetings with an annual weekend Caller Training event, to include the SDCCGB AGM; unfortunately, this idea was not pursued.

Looking back, I realise how successful the sessions that Dave and I ran actually were - and it leads me to wonder: would these - as a replacement for the National meetings -work again? Could Caller Training in the UK for Callers of all levels of experience (along the lines that Dave and I used) be useful? If you think it might - please let me know...

Jean really was a beautiful person inside and out. Obituary ~ Jean Preston 1929-2021

Mum, Jean, Jeanie, Mother Goose.

Despite her achievements, Mum remained humble throughout her Square and Round dancing life, avoiding any form of praise or tribute and would perhaps have given us an 'over the top of her glasses' look if she knew we would be writing here. Sorry Mum....

Mum first danced in the 1960's at Rainbow Squares in Nottingham and quickly convinced Dad ('Arry) to upgrade from taxi driver to dance partner. Soon all the family were enjoying many square dance holidays and dance events. Square Dancing had become an important part of our family social life.



When Dad decided he would like to try calling, friend Dave Clay encouraged Mum and Dad and they soon spent more time dancing and calling at social dances (One Night Stands) and other square dance holidays and events.

On January 2nd 1967 Mum and Dad opened their own club dancing on the top floor of the multistorey Walton House, occupied by GPO Telephones (with views over the city of Nottingham) - the very successful Dial A Square ('Dial A') was born. Mum gave everybody a one-to-one warm welcome in the building's lobby and escorted dancers to the dance floor via a lift that had a mind of its own! The Jean and 'Arry line-up provided a great blend of fun and sound, light-hearted teaching and dancing, attracting all ages (including a group of teenagers that are still meeting up socially today)! Mum was keen to make it fun! Dial A party nights were frequent and the place to go, and many dancers said that every club night was a like a Saturday party night. Dial A danced with sets in double figures for many years due to the great combined personalities and skills of 'Arry and Jean. Inspired by Mum's bubbly, engaging approach to leading a club, other club leaders have also taken a cue, so to speak, and gone on to have their own similar successful square dance clubs. Mum and Dad were soon travelling the county doing birthday dances and similar - and a five-year booking diary quickly appeared by the telephone!

When Dad died in 1979 Mum was devastated, but with the help of square dance friends found the courage to learn how to teach round dances, spending hours on the 'kitchen dance floor' honing her skills with daughter Debbie as a partner.

A determined Mum soon opened Dial A Round in the local village hall. With her ready smile, bubbly yet clear cuing style, she quickly received bookings and was soon on the programme at many Saturday nights, weekends and holiday events, ably assisted and supported by Heather and Debbie. And of

course, Mum also enjoyed cuing at Charnwood round dance club, spending a happy 13 years there, with help from ever supportive friend of over 50 years Dave Woolerton to make the travel enjoyable and possible. Meanwhile, Mum was also a founder member and enjoyed dancing at ACES SDC; and also taught new square dancers at Dial A Square, who remember her keenness to get things correct whilst having a laugh. Mum's dancer friend Les had become a partner and they shared time together on long dog walks in the Peak District and watching sport.

Whilst Mum had an assured teaching, cuing and personality style she shied away from any adulation, so it was great for friends and family to see Mum accept her well-deserved Hall of Fame award from the Round Dance Council in September 2013. And of course, Mum was so grateful for the long-standing presence and help from Keith and Carole Sutcliffe (Dial A) and Charnwood's Brian and Dorothy Chapman.

With a lifetime of dancing experience including 38 years of cuing experience Mum was delighted that she was able to hand over Dial a Round to the very able Amy Richardson who had been shadowing Mum for a number of years and at the end of 2017 Mum retired from her very natural home of dance leadership. Dad died at just 54, so they will have a lot of enjoyable catching up to do now!

Callers have said how easy it was to share the stage with Mum – a professional. She had developed a deep understanding of the mechanics and deft microprogramming required to make a square and round dance an atmospheric event. Mums contribution to an evening went beyond the straightforward presentation of a popular round. She had a sixth sense for the required atmosphere throughout the dance and ensured a synergy between the callers' choices and her own presentation. An unseen skill that many callers have enjoyed whilst sharing a stage.

We have received so many comforting words from dancers cuers and callers and it won't surprise anyone to know that many comments received include 'a lovely lady' and 'like a big sister'; 'she was just there for you'; 'unique in every regard'; irreplaceable'. With her animated and cheerful, light hearted and engaging persona – and her very own catch phrase 'pretty to watch', Mum will be missed and remembered for many years.

Dancers remember Mum's reassuring presence and guidance both on and off stage and she became known as 'Mother Goose' to many, or simply a fond 'Jeanie' to others. We are proud that Mum is regarded by some as a luminary in the Square and Round Dance world – more than a guiding 'Twinkle' to round dancers.

Rest in peace Mum.
