STOP PRESS

The BAASDC AGM took place on October 30th. A report will appear in the December issue, but the salient points were as follows:

Reports were received from the President, Treasurer and the various Area Federations, all of which reported good signs of the recovery of real dancing and appreciation was expressed for the efforts made in zoom dancing.

It was proposed that a small group should be set up to examine the BAASDC Constitution and volunteers to join this group were asked to contact the Council Secretary.

David Eagland was elected as our new President, Geoff Holdsworth as our new Secretary, Susan Ellis took up her old role as PRO and Roy Evans was elected as an 'ordinary' Council member. All these were unopposed. Koli Pluck remains on the Council as Treasurer.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello, allow me to introduce myself. I am David Eagland, the new President of BAASDC.

For those of you who do not know me, I graduated in 2006 at White Rose Squares Harrogate, along with my wife Sandra. We also danced at Harmony Squares and The Chain Gang.

FOOTWEAR: Any shoes, boots or slippers that double the size of your feet, are clearly inappropriate for dancing, although they will without doubt keep your feet warm. Maybe doubling up on socks is one answer, or soaking your feet in a bowl of hot water between tips would be a better solution.

HANDWEAR: fur-lined mittens, tempting they may be, are clearly not conducive to maintaining adequate hand contact in a square. The wearing of yellow Marigold gloves, with a triple-layer of natural rubber latex, will just get you talked about and as for gauntlets don't even go there!

However, for you traditionalists just double or treble up on the petticoats and frillies and keep a warm coat or shawl handy to wrap around yourself between tips. And as for the lady dancers, well?

Let's make Square and Round Dancing great again.

Returning to dancing in West Wales

At long last Aeron Valley Diamonds here in West Wales we were informed that we could now return to dancing at the beginning of October at our usual Monday night venue. All our members were eager to get going.

Talking to many friends across the border, it would seem that dancers in various areas have to comply with different restrictions at the halls where they dance. Some only requiring that the attendees be "double Jabbed" others include, not using kitchens, using hand sanitation, good ventilation etc.

The hall we use has required that we submit our own Risk Assessment before being allowed to dance at the hall. It had to be resubmitted on two occasions. This was to ensure it covered all the requirements that the Welsh Assembly had put in place, or what our hall management had interpreted them to be. (Shown on next page)

I accept the main priority is the safety and wellbeing of our dancers, but I do wonder if this is bureaucracy going a little over the top.

Due to the required strict compliance with the regulations, which would allow little socialising and the high increase of infection in our local area, we have decided to wait until the New Year before reopening the club.

It would be interesting to know what clubs in other areas have had to comply with to return to dancing?

Aeron Valley Diamonds Square dance club. Hall covid Risk Assessment & procedure.

The club will ensure it's members comply with the procedures laid down in the hall Risk assessment.

Anyone who has been advised to self isolate or experiencing Covid symptoms before leaving home should not attend club night.

On arriving at the hall:

The club organisers will arrive in advance of the club members. They will unlock the hall and open the ventilation points and ensure all safety materials are in place, any likely contact area will be sanatised prior to club members arriving

At the entrance to the building:

Hand sanitation station, individuals temperature taken, anyone showing a raised temperature will not be allowed to enter the hall. A record of attendance will be kept together with contact details for at least one month.

In the building:

On entering the building face masks/visors will be worn. These may be removed when dancing. When sitting out masks/visors will be worn and sitting socially distanced observed.

Prior to dancing, members will collect their own plastic chairs from the store. They will wipe the chair with anti-bacterial wipes provided. They will only use that chair throughout the evening. At the end of the evening they will wipe their chair with anti-bacterial wipes and return to storage. Hand sanitizer provided by the club will be available to use at all times especially in between dances.

To abide by Government legislation, dancers will be required to dance in the same square for the duration of the evening. Two couple dancing will be introduced where possible. This will be reviewed as and when legislation changes.

Members will be required to bring their own refreshments as use of the kitchen will not be allowed.

Vacating the hall:

Club members will leave the hall via the route designated with as little contact to fixtures as possible. An organiser from the group will be the last to leave the hall ensuring all contact points on doors etc. are sanitized. Any used cleaning materials bagged, sealed and disposed of away from the hall.

Heyford Hoofers Square Dance Club

Back in 2002, the Heyford Hoofers moved from their "ancestral" home of Lower and Upper Heyford to the fast-growing metropolis that is today's Bicester. This was to combat falling attendances and to try and attract new dancers otherwise there was a strong chance of the club folding.

At times since then life has been a struggle for the club, but current day membership numbers have stabilised and indeed seem to be growing again. Like many clubs, Covid hit us hard and there were times when even its organising committee wondered if the club would ever return to holding weekly club nights.

But we stayed in touch with our members, sought their views and are trying to implement them. Over the past 19 years, home has been a community hall in one of Bicester's large housing "villages." That is now unavailable to us as our regular Tuesday evening slot has been taken by another organisation. Our members have insisted that Tuesday must be square dancing day and evenings were the best times to meet. So, the search was on for a new hall.

And we may have found it.

St Edburg's Church Hall nestles behind its church and is named after St Eadburh, a 9th century nun of some mystery, who must have done saintly things in this area of Bicester. The hall was opened in 1967 but found to be too expensive to run and a smaller hall, covering part of the same site, was opened in 1992. We booked it for 12th October as a return to square dancing venue and our members flocked to the new venue...well 17 of us, anyway, including 3 new dancers. Just as encouraging was the fact that 9 others apologised for their absence and insisted that they would be happy to join us on future Tuesdays. No hall is perfect, and we know we were spoilt by the facilities at our previous home. It is more expensive and that needs to be watched but it has a good dance floor, and we enjoyed a 2 hour snappy session, hosted by our long-standing caller Bob Billinghurst.

The Heyford Hoofers are back! So too, is our famous Christmas in July dance on Saturday 2nd July 2022 at nearby Arncott. Further details to be announced.

Reviews of Square Dance releases from other labels by



PAUL BRISTOW

(owner and producer of STING & SNOW records)

The Night That Marshall Flippo Came to Town ~ Flippo's Friends Rhythm Classic RC 203 (Original Artist: Johnny Cash)

A tribute to Marshall Flippo, one of the most loved and successful Callers, whom we lost last year. It is based on "The Night Hank Williams Came to Town" which was written by Bobby Braddock and Charlie Williams, originally recorded by Johnny Cash for his 1987 album "Johnny Cash Is Coming to Town". A wonderful piece of well produced music, featuring seven of the top US Callers - all of whom were personal friends of Flippo!

Mainstream Choreography: Heads Promenade Halfway, Sides Square Thru Right and Left Thru, Eight Chain Six, Swing the Corner Lady and Promenade.

Knock Three Times ~ Andy Allemao

Blue Star BS 2632 (Original Artists: Tony Orlando & Dawn)

This song was released in 1970 and was originally just credited to "Dawn" - no mention of Tony Orlando, who (at the time of release) was working for a different label); it hit No. 1 on the Billboard Hot 100 in January 1971 - and achieved the same in the UK. It was written by L. Russell Brown and Irwin Levine. Blue Star have had to re-arrange it to make a Square Dance but it works just fine; good music, supported by a good vocal.

Mainstream Figure: Four Ladies Chain Three Quarters, Heads Promenade Halfway, Lead Right, Circle to a Line, Slide Thru, Pass Thru, Allemande Left.

Teach Your Children Well ~ *Chris Froggatt, Hayley Froggatt* Knee Deep KDM 146 (*Original Artists: Crosby, Stills Nash & Young*)

A song by Graham Nash, written when he was still a member of the Hollies - but never recorded by them; the track first appeared on the CSNY album "Déjà Vu" in 1970. The lyrics reflect on the "societal implications of messages given to children about war and other issues". Knee Deep feature a Steel Guitar sound - in the style of Jerry Garcia, of the Grateful Dead (who played on the original); Chris provides a very effective vocal!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Square Thru Four, Circle to a Line, Pass Thru Wheel and Deal, Double Pass Thru, Cloverleaf, Pass Thru, Swing, Promenade.

Hey Good Looking ~ Sam Tajima

Rawhide RWH 1242 (Original Artist: Hank Williams)

Hank Williams wrote this in twenty minutes, during a plane trip with Jimmy Dickens, in 1951; it was inspired by a 1942 song - of the same title - written by Cole Porter. The track also featured the playing of the "Drifting Cowboys Band" and was recorded at the Castle Studio in Nashville. Rawhide have used a style very faithful to the original, with a "Walking Bass" that works really well; Sam Tajima from Japan provides a great vocal!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Promenade Halfway, Walk in Square Thru Four Right and Left Thru, Veer Left, Ferris Wheel, Square Thru Three, Swing.

What's in a Kiss ~ Jeffrey Garbutt

Silver Sounds SSR 414 (Original Artist: Gilbert O'Sullivan)

From 1980, this was the first single that Gilbert O'Sullivan released when he returned to recording following a brief hiatus brought about by a legal battle that he fought with the record company for whom he worked (he won the case and received all the money that he was owed). A song asking a simple question; "made over" here by Silver Sounds some well recorded music, with a wonderful vocal by Jeffrey Garbutt from Australia!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Square Thru Four, Right Hand Star, Star Left Touch a Quarter, Split Circulate, Boys Run, Pass the Ocean, Girls Trade.

Christmas Stuff ~ Kip Garvey, Carol Hilliard (Reardon)

Riverboat RIV 1063 (Original Artist: Nathan Carter)

The title track, from the 2014 album by English-Irish country singer Nathan Carter (his sixth album), which peaked at No. 8 on the Irish Albums Chart; a well written song with a very pleasant message about the things that we used to do at Christmas and how we would like to do them again. Riverboat presents this with a Swing Rhythm, using some top quality instrumentation; vocal tracks are by Kip and Carol - with a Harmony option!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Square Thru Four, Swing Thru, Boys Cross Run Chain Down the Line, Flutterwheel, Slide Thru, Swing and Promenade.

CAUGHT SPEEDING

Calling to 5 different groups over the last month has interested me in observing how different the speed of dancing is since 2019-20.

I'm not one of those fast moving callers who feels it's necessary to call at 128 beats a minute. I find I'm watching the feet on a circle left and judging my speed accordingly.

With the latest computer programs that will change tempo and key individually this allows me the freedom to enjoy singing the song or delivering the calls in a timely manner for the dancers in front of me.

When we were playing records, you know those black vinyl discs with a hole in the middle, if you played the music faster I had to sing higher and if slower I could sing lower. Small changes didn't notice but it was comical sometimes if the voice on the flip side of the record was too fast it sounded like the Chipmunks and if too slow sounded as though it came from the callers boots. Today's technology however allows these changes to speed and key to be independent of each other.

This month I have called to a group that had a couple of brand new dancers. So by judging the ability of those two dancers to comprehend what was instructed I could start off slow but by the end of the evening allow more speed to be used so making those dancers feel the excitement and exhilaration we all feel when we dance.

Yet another group only needed a couple of tips to show me they hadn't forgotten anything so I was able to try to use every move in that program just to reassure them they were solid.

In yet another group with just one new lady it was the so called experienced dancers who were having more trouble than she was. So it just goes to show that each group you call for needs individual attention to give them the best experience you can.

This is called 'judgement' and at every dance a caller calls they have to make these on the spot decisions. This is one of the first hurdles the new caller has to leap, so please be kind to new callers and give them your total support. They may have to learn by their mistakes so your tolerance will be greatly appreciated. But what ever you do don't inundate them with unskilled advice. They will have a mentor working with them who will put them on the right path.

So welcome back to our wonderful world of Square Dancing. Show your appreciation and support to all our callers, it's just as hard for them to fit back into their role after the 18 months shut away from the world as it is for you, the dancers..

Caller's Corner UK CALLER TRAINING FOUNDATION PAUL BRISTOW

The only three Formations, from where an Allemande Left can be called...

In previous articles I wrote about the fact that - when using Symmetrical Choreography (as most Callers do 99% of the time) - the Corner is never more than 3 moves away for an Allemande Left. I also wrote about the Four Allemandes (and why there are actually Five of them!) and how knowledge of the location of these - and the ability to recognise them - will allow a Caller to find a valid Allemande Left in 3 moves or less.

In this article, I want to look at another way of approaching the same problem; that is: "recognising the situation(s) from where a successful Allemande Left can be Called". It is said that that everybody's brain works differently and (because of that) - sometimes considering a question from a different point of view can provide an obvious and easier answer; this might be useful for anyone that finds the other systems confusing. Here is an alternative way to look for a "way out" of any situation that a Caller might create...

The simple concept is that there are only three formations from where an Allemande Left can be called; two of these are utilised in the idea behind the Four Allemandes the other one describes the 5th Allemande formation - not found in 2 X 4 choreography.

Formation (1) Eight Chain Thru: where Dancers stand to begin an Eight Chain Thru

Formation (2) Trade By: where the Dancers stand to begin a Trade By

The above are both 2 Dancer by 4 Dancer (2 X 4 Formations) and (as I have mentioned previously) almost all choreography can be expressed in these terms; however, any that cannot be expressed in terms of 2 X 4 Formations will sit in Formation (3) shown below.

Formations (1) & (2) Allemande Three Allemande Two Allemande Four Allemande One

Formation (3) The "O" Formation: Choreography in which all Eight Dancers working around the "Flagpole Centre of the Square", are involved; maybe a better name for this Formation would be something like: "General 8 dancer Flag-Pole-Centred Circle or Star", it would include the Static Square (from where everything starts), all 8 person Circles (e.g. Alamo Style rings, Single File Promenades, Weave the Ring, etc.) and all the Eight person Star Calls (e.g. Allemande Thar, including Wrong Way Thar, Ladies Chains etc.).

I have not attempted to show any diagrams of the "O" Formation; as there are so many but they are easy enough to "imagine" and even draw, if necessary. The letter "O" can also stand for the term "Opener"; this is an essential part of the vast majority of Singing Calls (and is also known as the "Middle Break" or "Closer") - it occurs three times in many Singing Calls, without changing Sequence or Partner Relationship; "Openers" are also used in Patter choreography; if Callers were to use only "Openers", with care there would NEVER be any danger of getting the Dancers crossed! However, when using this type of Choreography to satisfy the Dancers, Callers must be as inventive as possible...

Obituary ~ **Julia Beckley** (equity name JULIA JACKSON)

Julia was born 21/06/1942 and as her Mother and Father were both keen square dancers she became immersed in the 'square dance world ' from a very early age. When she, and her new husband moved to Braintree in Essex, there were no square dance clubs in her area so she bravely decided to try and teach local friends basic dance moves, with herself doing the 'calling'. Later on in life she visited the USA for the first time, for a holiday organised by an experienced square dance couple. As was normal, anybody in the 'group' who could call was asked to 'call a guest tip' when they visited different clubs. The result was that upon the return to England, her fellow travellers asked her to 'call' at their clubs.

Her reputation as a caller grew until she became one of the top 'in demand' callers in the Country.

In the 70's she decided to branch out and organised her first 'square dance' holidays in the UK and Jersey etc. In the early eighties she bravely organised her first USA square dance holiday. Every one of her fourteen USA holidays commenced at the National Convention and then involved a further two and a half weeks traveling and dancing in some amazing places. She always said it was a holiday with square dancing - not a square dance holiday. Having visited places such as Hawaii, Mexico, Las Vegas etc. etc., she calculated that, with our own travels, there were only eight States we had not visited. In this country she ran over thirty holidays and amazingly, many couples came with us time and time again.

Other square dance highlights included an appearance at the Royal Albert Hall and many many 'fun' Square Dance evenings for high profile companies including Kodak, Rolls Royce, Hilton Hotels and Holiday Inns. In fact I first met JULIA when, as a senior manager at Holiday Inns Head Office, and at the advice of my assistant, I booked Julia for a staff fun dance at the Bristol HI Hotel. The rest is history! Thirty six incredible years together followed.

Other highlights included making six records, forming the JayDees western dance club ('Julia/David') which we ran for 13 years- it is still going 16 years later. She appeared acting in several TV shows as an Equity member, became a 'brilliant Painter' of animals, which she loved. We actually had over a hundred ducks, six goats and a couple of pet sheep - not forgetting our incredible dogs who, many will remember, at her Sing-along-a-Julia Dances. We both played in a Ukulele band for five years and she also played the Piano and guitar. An incredibly talented lady whom I will miss very very much.

As she wanted, she is buried at a 'Natural Burial Ground' in a 'meadow' in 'rolling countryside'.

Obituary ~ **Richard Tinson** (20/8/40 - 14/10/21)

Sadly Richard passed away in the arms of his wife Anthea on 14 October 2021 after a short illness. He will be much missed by the many square dancers (UK, USA and elsewhere) who knew him.

He was born in Leeds on 20 August 1940. He trained and qualified as an electrical engineer for National Grid and, as well as working in the UK, he had spells working in the USA and Saudi.

He learnt to square dance in the USA in the mid-1960s while working in Connecticut. He and his then wife Mary and three children returned to Nottingham, England but he did not return to square dancing until a work-related move took him to Harrogate where he joined White Rose Squares.

After a while, his work took him to Saudi Arabia where he continued to square dance and also began calling and teaching.

On return to the UK, he continued his calling and teaching activities at Cloverleaf Squares in Bradford where he met Anthea who, at that stage, was new to square dancing. About 2 years after meeting, Richard and Anthea started a basics/MS club, Wharfedale Spinners in Guiseley, Leeds. They married in May 1994.

A member of Caller's Club, Richard was very highly regarded for his patient and thorough teaching skills which equipped his dancers well for dancing outside the club. In time, Richard and Anthea progressed to the Advanced programme and eventually joined The Pacesetters on the other side of the Pennines. They went on to learn C1, C2 and C3A.

As Challenge dancers, they regularly danced at the twice-yearly Advanced & Challenge weekend dances organised by Jean & Trevor Knott at various venues in the Midlands, most notably Wombourne, near Stourbridge. When the Knotts decided to wind down, Richard provided valuable support to Anthea when she joined forces with Rosemary Turton to keep those weekends going. That entailed bringing in and hosting many top callers (such as Ed Foote, Dave Wilson, Lee Kopman, Ben Rubright, Barry Clasper, Ross Howell, Sandy Bryant, Mike Jacobs, and Anne Uebelacker), ferrying them around and providing them with accommodation and hospitality during their stay in the country.

Richard and Anthea were very keen caravanners and travelled in their touring caravan to many events around the country at all dance programmes. They were staunch supporters of the Lytham Festival events and he called some C1 teach sessions there.

When Richard retired from work, they decided to discontinue running the Wharfedale Spinners club and began to spread their wings, travelling especial-

ly to the USA to spend long stays at Mesa, Arizona where they could square dance, along with the many American friends they acquired, virtually every day of the week to popular callers such as Dave Wilson, Ben Rubright, Todd Fellegy and Bill Haynes.

Even though he had retired, Richard continued to work part-time primarily in a teaching capacity for National Grid, being highly regarded by his work colleagues. He also continued to call for White Rose Squares and Pannal Partners after closure of the Wharfedale Spinners and he continued to dance all programmes up to C3A even after, in recent years, enduring major spinal surgery and two knee replacements.

He was a real gentleman who was always ready to lend a hand, helping others at the caravan sites, setting things up at square dances, encouraging dancers new to the different programmes and sharing his wide experience and knowledge of square dancing. He has been a real credit to the square dance community in terms of his dancing and calling abilities but, above all, he will be fondly remembered for his dry wit and the fun and friendship he and Anthea shared with everyone fortunate to come in contact with them.

Our thoughts go out to Anthea and their 4 children and 13 grandchildren for the loss of a much-loved husband, father and grandfather.

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


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
