My Heart Will Go On ~ Kyomi Taneyama

Rhythm International RI 958 (Original Artist: Celine Dion)

Topping the charts in over twenty countries, this song - the theme from the 1997 film: "Titanic", with lyrics by Will Jennings and Music by James Horner - is considered to be Celine Dion's signature song and has had worldwide sales estimated at over 18 million copies; it is also one of the best-selling physical singles of all time! Rhythm have put together some great music, with Kyomi Taneyama from Japan "shining" on the vocal!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Promenade Halfway, Walk in Square Thru Four Swing Thru, Boys Run, Ferris Wheel, Square Thru Three, Swing Corner.

Stretchy Pants ~ Mike Seastrom / Patty Greene

Chic CHIC 1073 / 2073 (Original Artists: Carrie Underwood)

Carrie Underwood winner of the fourth season of "American Idol", in 2005 and the most awarded country artist of all time, released "Stretchy Pants", which she co-wrote with Hillary Lindsey and Chris DeStefano, in 2021 - to support the charitable Nashville-based free shopping organization, "The Store". It is a "comedy single" about what to wear when eating too much! Top quality Chic music - in two versions, with first rate vocals.

Mainstream Figure: Promenade Half, Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru Pass Thru, Trade By, Slide Thru, Pass the Ocean, Girls Trade, Swing Thru.

Red and Rio Grande ~ Darryl Lipscomb, Jon & Deborah C-Jones ESP ESP 239 (Original Artist: Doug Supernaw)

Title track from the 1993 album by Doug Supernaw, released as a single in 1994; it was written by Doug together with Lonnie Atkinson. The lyrics of the song tell you all about being a Texan and living between the "Red" (River) and the "Rio Grande", the two main waterways in Texas. The vocal is delivered by Darryl Lipscomb and Jon Jones and also features Deborah Carroll Jones on the Harmony - in all terms, an excellent recording!

Mainstream Choreography: Four Ladies Chain, Heads Promenade Half Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru, Touch a Quarter, Scootback, Swing.

Somebody Take Me Home ∼ Jet Roberts

Arrowhead ARROW 1154 (Original Artist: Kenny Chesney)

A song from Kenny Chesney's tenth studio album: "The Road and the Radio" that was released in 2005. The track was written by Randy Rogers of the "Randy Rogers Band", together with singer/songwriter Radney Foster; it has not yet been released as a single. It tells the tale of someone that sleeps on the floor because he doesn't like the bed and just wants to go home. Jet provides a superb vocal - on some great Arrowhead music!

Mainstream Figure: Promenade Half, Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru Pass Thru, Trade By, Swing Thru, Spin the Top, Slide Thru, Swing Corner.

I Wanna Sing ∼ *Jerry Junck*

HiHat HH 5361 (Original Artist: Jayme Patterson; Willa Dorsey)

This is based on a 1978 song, with lyrics by Wayne Eddie Fargason and Gary Vacca; the first line of which is: "I wanna sing in the name of Jesus", it was originally re-written as a Square Dance Singing Call, by Chaparral many years ago - with Tim Crawford on the vocal. This new version, is played in two Rhythmic styles - so that all the breaks "feel" slow and easy - and the figures "feel" fast, with a scintillating vocal from Jerry Junck!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Promenade Halfway, Walk in Square Thru Four Touch a Quarter, Scootback, Boy Run, Star Thru, Pass Thru, Trade By, Swing.

From A Jack To A King ~ Nicholas Brendzy

Rawhide RWH 1244 (Original Artist: Ned Miller)

Ned Miller wrote and first released this song in 1957 - it was not a success; however he persuaded his label to re-release it five years later, whereupon it became a "Crossover Hit" in the US reaching number one on the Irish Singles Chart - and number two on the UK Singles Chart, becoming the "sixth-most-played single of 1963" in the UK. Some really good music from Rawhide, together with a well-recorded vocal by Nicholas!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Promenade Halfway, Walk in Square Thru Four Right and Left Thru, Veer Left, Ferris Wheel, Square Thru Three, Swing.

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
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WHITE ROSE SQUARES – LOCKDOWN, DANCING AND GRADUATION – AT LAST!

Caller's Corner BY PAUL BRISTOW (CALLERLAB Accredited Caller Coach) Accredited Caller Coach)

How do you make the best use of your Memory, can it be improved?

Sometimes, people compliment me by saying that I must have a fantastic memory to be able to remember all of the choreography that I use. On these occasions, I will always smile politely and nod my head - but the fact is that I do not have an "eidetic memory" (the sort that can retain information in that fashion). Any Caller blessed with this type of memory should (obviously) develop these skills and try to retain as much memorised choreography as they can. However, most Callers probably have a memory somewhat similar to mine - and are unable remember such an extensive amount of information.

Some might try to overcome this by reading choreographic routines i.e. by not looking at the Dancers - but instead looking at a computer screen or a piece of paper, this will always seriously damage the performance of a Caller and should be avoided at all costs. Anyone with a non-eidetic memory can still make use of the memory that they have to Call effectively - by prioritising on essentials - and doing all that they can to "exercise".

The first thing you must be able to memorise are the names of the Calls on each list (as well as which Calls are on which list). Secondly, you need to know the definitions of the Calls and how each and every Call can be used in sequence with the others, in terms of Body Flow. With this, creating effective choreography "on the fly" - is quite possible.

A non-eidetic memory needs to be constantly exercised. I always try to find new ways to Call things, I always look for things I haven't Called before - either by reading about them in note services - or by using pen and paper to research choreographic ideas.

The moment you stop exercising your memory, will be the moment that it will start to let you down. To give you an example of this, think about Singing Calls: when we were using vinyl every Singing Call came with a cue sheet, or a printed sleeve upon which the lyrics and the choreography were written. Obviously, it was possible to create your own choreography - but you did need to learn the lyrics of the song to make the Singing Call work. I spent a lot of time trying to memorize the lyrics that I needed even to the point where I would put the lyrics sheet face down on the table and try to Call from memory, in the event that my memory didn't quite do what I wanted it to, I could turn the sheet over and remind myself of the correct lyrics; this all changed with the use of computers.

The software for Callers - that most are using - automatically displays the lyrics for the tune and (consequently) the Caller will always have the lyrics "available" - should they need them, which sounds like an excellent idea but - the "downside" is that if you don't have the lyrics on the screen, remembering them seems to have become a lot more difficult and (as a result of that) you'll often see Callers spending too much time looking at their computer screens during the Singing Call, trying to find the words of the song, when they should be watching the Dancers, to check that they are coping successfully with the choreography of the Singing Call! I have no professional medical qualification - but I'm pretty sure that when it comes to memory, if you don't use it - you will lose it! So Callers should "exercise" - by trying to avoid using the software "lyrics page" - as much as they can (and by concentrating on discovering what each Call actually does)!

Round Dancing: 6 months post lockdown easing

Back in the summer of 2021, as lockdown became less draconian, some of the RD clubs began to re-open. In the autumn of 2020 **R**ed **K**ite had briefly re-opened following a set of guidelines devised by Nick Wright: in addition to local hall hygiene rules these included dancing only with one partner, no overtaking on the dance floor and bringing your own drinks. **A**round **2000** and **S**carlet **R**ibbons subsequently adopted these guidelines.

A2K (meeting monthly) and RK (meeting twice monthly) both moved to larger (and sadly more expensive) halls and re-opened at the end of May, while SR re-started the weekly beginners class in July and added the regular dancers in August as social distancing is more difficult in the hall. Some dancers chose to wear masks and/or gloves when dancing with a partner from a different social bubble. They no longer do this, and a few dancers will now dance with a different partner for certain rhythms, remembering to use hand gel before and after.

At the outset, the major concerns for the dancers were "forgetting" and fitness. To reassure dancers, at all three clubs we began by using tips of only 2 (rather than the usual three) dances in the same rhythm gradually building up the basic figures again - revising where necessary. In practice we found that throughout the first class, dancers rapidly improved in both response times and remembering familiar figures. Most dancers had been quite active during lockdown, walking and cycling being favourite activities, but dancing uses the body in different ways so we were careful to start with a warm up and end with cool down stretches. However sustained concentration was quite tiring for both dancers and Cuers/Teachers so programming needed to allow for this and has remained quite flexible.

Obviously the more experienced dancers had better recall of the basic figures and common rhythms which are locked in long-term memory; also those who had danced via Zoom were less rusty both physically and mentally. Some dancers had used the RD Instruction website for revision. At the end of each first session the most common problem reported was wearing "proper" shoes again – most dancers wearing trainers for exercise and slippers or sandals at other times.

All three clubs have lost some dancers during lockdown; some permanently through age/illness/injury but some hopefully will return when they are ready. Red Kite is the only club to have recruited new dancers from the general public – they began a Cha Cha class in October. Fortunately none of the existing dancers felt their safety was compromised during this exercise, and the new dancers are making excellent progress.

At the time of writing (mid December) although Covid restrictions are being extended, Dancing has been specifically recognised as a form of exercise, and we do not currently need to wear masks while dancing although we may be asked to wear them in communal areas of venues. Only SR plan a Christmas celebration this year. It will be quite limited compared with previous years; we will not dance the usual mixers but we will enjoy a socially distanced hot drink, goodies and a chat.

The main object of our clubs is to have a lot of fun whilst we are dancing. Making friends which for some of us have lasted decades. Travelling the world either virtually or in person, meeting and making more friends from around the world. We thrive on friendships; It's a beautiful thing.

Stay strong and keep in touch with the other members of your clubs. Be ready to dance whenever circumstances make it possible. We'll get through this bad time just like all those people did before us.


