As you read this, just pause for a moment, and reflect on the fact that it is only possible because of the sterling efforts of one man, Peter Wright the Editor of Let's Square Dance Magazine. He celebrated his 90th birthday on Monday 23rd October.

Peter started dancing with his wife Phyllis in 1975 at Cheltenham Swinging Squares where he still calls and dances.

Peter took over as Editor at very short notice when Chris Allen suddenly died in 2014. Peter thought that as he used the same desktop publishing programme as Chris he offered to take up the post and his offer was accepted. The rest as they say is history.

Peter was responsible for introducing colour which greatly enhanced the look of the magazine. When Covid struck in 2019 the B.A.A.S.D.C. took the decision to cease posting printed copies and start using email. This had the added benefit of ensuring that every dancer could receive the magazine for free. Prior to this the magazine had only been produced for ten months per year. Peter suggested that it should be sent out every month as a way of keeping the dancing fraternity in touch with each other.

As an avid reader I read the magazine from cover to cover, but it would be nice if the magazine had a few more pages. And that means, in journalist jargon, more copy; it needs more articles, anecdotes, anything that our readers would find interesting, and that's down to you. I know Peter is responsible for the Chuckle Zone and many articles from his archive, but he can only do so much.

Have you danced in a weird place? Tell us about your experiences as a dancer? Many of you have travelled far and wide to dance, tell us about it. We have some dancers learning to Call, can you tell us how you are getting on? Caller Workshops

I have seen and heard several references recently to newer callers needing more mic' time to get the experience they need to progress their calling development. Well, it occurred to me that despite being generally chaotically busy, I may still be able to offer a little assistance in providing the opportunity for some extra mic' time.

Read on.....

You may have seen details of the 'Taste of Christmas' weekend that I call in December on the Isle of Wight in the events pages. It is a MS/Plus event from Friday evening until Monday morning, but Saturday and Sunday afternoons are free time for relaxing or exploring, so I have decided that this is a great opportunity for me to offer caller workshops on those afternoons for any callers who book for the weekend and would like to get that valuable but sometimes elusive mic' time.

There are two sessions available, 2 & 1/2 hours each, predominantly for calling, with preparation in advance to keep discussion on the day to a minimum and maximise the benefit to any callers taking part. So it will be like sharing the calling for a whole dance on each day, not just calling a guest tip. This is on offer as an extra benefit to any callers who book for the weekend, but especially those who do not call for a club and therefore do not have regular, continuous mic' time.

So, if you are a caller who has already booked for the weekend or if you are considering booking and you are interested in these workshops, please let me know by email as soon as possible so that I can send out appropriate details and material for preparation in the next few weeks prior to the start of the event on 1st December.

I appreciate that this is short notice for this year's event but if there are any callers interested, I am willing to run the workshops as a trial. We will of course need some dancers, who may be callers' partners or anyone attending the weekend who is happy to help with caller experience and development.

If there is demand and support for this, I will continue to offer it at future events.

Chuckle Zone

From the Archives. Rules for Square Dances

(Source unknown, re-found recently under glass in a small picture frame.)

- 1. Admittance \$0.50, refreshments included.
- 2. The music is to consist of a fiddle, a pipe or tabor, or a hurdy-gurdy. No chorus is to be sung until the dancing is over,
- 3. No lady to dance in black stockings, nor have her elbows bare,
- 4. Every lady to come with a handkerchief with name marked.
- 5. To prevent spitting, no gentlemen will chew tobacco or smoke.
- 6. No gentleman will dance in a great coat unless his under one be torn.
- 7. No lady will dress her hair in tallow candle nor must she have a bunch of hair sticking up top of her head,
- 8. Leather small clothes except newly washed are forbidden, as they might soil the ladies' gowns.
- 9. To prevent tearing of the planking, no gentlemen will dance in nailed shoes or boots.
- 10. No whispering to be allowed, If anyone shall be found to make insidious remarks about anyone's dancing, he or she shall be put out of the room.
- 11. No gentleman will appear with a cravat that has been worn more than a week or a fortnight.
- 12. No scissors or gimlets are to be brought either by ladies or gentlemen unless their pockets are whole.
- 13. Long beards are forbidden as they would be very disagreeable if a gentleman should happen to put his cheek beside a lady's.
- 14. Those ladies who have not white stockings and black Morocco leather shoes will not be admitted under any pretence whatever. Two old ladies to examine all who enter.
- 15. No lady must appear with a veil on even if it be turned aside, as the gentleman will not have an opportunity of looking at her face distinct.
- 16. No gentleman must squeeze his partner's hand, nor look earnestly up on her, and furthermore, he must not pick up her handkerchief, provided it were to fall. The first denotes he loves her, the second he wishes to kiss her and the last that she makes a sign for both.
- 17. For distinction sake, the master of ceremonies is to wear a red coat, butt small clothes, black stockings, green shoes and a surtout. So wipe off your chin, pull down your vest, dance with the girls that you love best.

Printed magazine

However, the commercial printing and postage costs would make a return to that completely uneconomical, and as Susan pointed out in her musings, the emailed copy does make the magazine potentially available to more dancers (providing of course that the Club contacts do pass it on !)

However, all is not lost ! If you would prefer a printed copy, there is a way - D.I.Y. ! (either for your Club or as a personal copy).

The pdf file that is emailed to all Clubs is not directly printable (unless you are a real computer geek), but each month, just after the publication date, I produce a re-formatted pdf file which allows you to print out the mag. on A4 paper, which when folded, gives you the usual A5 booklet. I already send this out to around 8 Clubs who have requested it. The quality of home printing does not match that of a commercial print house, but is acceptable.

What is CALLERLAB?

Dancers trust their club callers to teach the definitions correctly and CALL-ERLAB is the part of our activity that is responsible for getting a consensus from their membership when trying to word the definitions so that they are clear in any language and unambiguous.

This clearly requires an International involvement of some sort.

It has been several years since the leaders of CALLERLAB have planned a foray into the outside world but in October next year an International meeting, or MINILAB, is being arranged in Germany to which all the European and UK callers are invited.

Back in 1995 we organised a MINILAB in the UK to which several members of the CALLERLAB Board of Governors visited with CALLERS CLUB who hosted a long weekend of workshops and discussions, creating a closer tie with our colleagues in the USA.

Next year the Chairman of the CALLERLAB Board of govenors, Ted Lizzotte plus one or two others from the Executive Board will be visiting and a long weekend in a Hotel is planned. Leaders of our Callers Club will try to attend plus leaders from all the square dancing countries in Europe and Scandinavia.

But all Callers are invited to participate so do encourage your Club Callers to take part too.

I can assure you it would be a very worthwhile Seminar to attend, to make friendships around the Continent. Just to compare how the different Nationalities run their Clubs and how well each country is coping with the challenges we are faced with all over the world.

Caller's Corner UK CALLER

Callers Corner - The advantages of using Computer Software to provide music

When I first started calling, I carried every record I owned around with me. Over time this collection grew to more than 400; I had two large boxes into which these fit. At first the big question was: "which tunes should I choose to use tonight"? I had 2 boxes of 200 records - the Singing Calls were sorted alphabetically by title - whilst the rest of the box held my Patter records, sorted in a similar fashion. I would work through the boxes and select about 30 or 40 potential choices, I'd take them out of the box, turn them slightly - and then leave them poking up at an angle - to give me a smaller sub selection from which I could choose. Buying new records required archiving older ones.

However, when I started to travel overseas, I realised that carrying this number of records was totally impractical, so I reduced my carrying collection to the number I could fit into a Samsung briefcase. This worked out to be roughly 80 records in total (usually, 60 Singing Calls and 20 Patters). That still gave me an opportunity to make a last minute selection, when I got to the venue - but had effectively reduced my access to the vast library of music that I owned. When I bought new records, I would remove some of the old ones from my briefcase... As a result of both of these management systems, I ended up with a steadily growing collection of records that I hardly ever had the chance to use. I had spent a fortune on music that I couldn't carry around with me!

Modern computer management systems for Square Dance music have made it easier for Callers to make efficient use of their "music library" (that collection of tunes that they have purchased) so as to provide a varied and well thought out programme for the Dancers. If it is set-up correctly, it also gives access to all the Call sheets; if I choose a tune to use, the lyrics sheet can be set to appear automatically, which is a great help.

Looking at it from my personal point-of-view, scrolling through 3000 (or more) pieces of music and trying to choose which one to use is very difficult; to get around this, modern software offers us the chance to make smaller lists of music, known as "Playlists", which is a great help; you can create as many of these folders with different titles as you wish.

As well as creating Playlists you can also create temporary playlists (that you might use for an evening's Calling); these are easy to create in the order that you want to use the music (this order can be changed quite simply), it is also very easy to delete or add any tunes. This temporary listing is very well designed - and is a very powerful tool.

Most importantly, this gives Callers the chance to work - over a period of time - through their entire musical repertoire - and ensure that Dancers are not subjected to the same tunes each time on club nights; in fact, with a repertoire of 3000 records, I should be able to call for several years before having to use the same piece of music again! It does not actually work this way in real terms because there is a tendency to use newer tunes on a regular basis until you become familiar with them; consequently, Dancers will notice some repetition - but as long as you don't lose sight of the fact that you have the opportunity to go back to that incredible reservoir of "old songs" and select some that you haven't used in a long time (that you think the dancers might enjoy), you can put together some wonderful evenings, in terms of musical styles, songs and genres...

Spetisbury Squares Celebrate a Wedding

Club leaders Andy and Angela commented that it was not often that they have the pleasure of celebrating weddings between our dancers, but that's exactly what Spetisbury Squares were able to do this August when John and Hillary, two of their 2022 beginner dancers, announced that they would be tying the knot.

A week or so before their special day, the club were able to spring a surprise celebration on the couple.

After being suitably atired with a flower coronette and flashing bow tie, the couple lead the rest of the dancers through a traditional wedding arch decorated with flowers hand-made by the dancers.

Taking Care of Business ~ Jet Roberts

Royal RYL 1024 (Original Artists: Bachman-Turner Overdrive)

From "Bachman-Turner Overdrive's" 1973 album: "Bachman-Turner Overdrive II" - almost written live on stage by Randy Bachman, when he had to take over as the lead vocalist part way through a performance, he suggested slight changes to a song they were developing, which became an "instant favourite" with the fans! A great piece of music by Royal Records, with a first rate instrumental and an excellent vocal from Jet!

Mainstream Figure: Promenade Half, Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru Pass Thru, Trade By, Slide Thru, Square Thru Three, Swing and Promenade.

Sweet Life ~ Dave Vieira & Michelle Vieira

Shade SHADE 106 (Original Artist: Paul Davis)

A song written, composed, and recorded by American singer-songwriter Paul Davis; it was the third single released from his 1977 album: "Singer of Songs: Teller of Tales" - and his fourth-highest peaking pop hit, peaking at #17 on the Billboard chart in late 1978. The song is about two people, with a family, counting their blessings - it uses an upbeat feel and a pop rhythm that works effectively; great vocal by Michelle and Dave!

Mainstream Figure: Promenade Half, Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru Pass Thru, Trade By, Touch a Quarter, Scoot Back x 2, Swing and Promenade.

Country Club ~ **Doug Davis**

Chinook CK 270 (Original Artist: Travis Tritt)

The lead single and title track from Travis Tritt's 1989 debut album; it peaked at No. 9 in the United States (and #22 in Canada). Written by Catesby Jones and Dennis Lord; the song had originally been cut by Alan Jackson. It is a light hearted song about a guy trying to get the attention of a girl - but he is not a member of her Country Club! Slow and steady country music, with a smooth rhythm and an outstanding vocal from Doug!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Square Thru Four, Swing Thru, Boys Run Right Couples Circulate, Chain Down the Line, Rollaway, Star Thru, Trade By.

I'm Cryin' ~ Scott Bennett

Crest CK 270 (Original Artist: Stevie Ray Vaughan)

The album: "Texas Flood" was released in 1983 and included this song as the 4th track on the B Side; it was written by Stevie Ray Vaughan; the album went "Double Platinum" (based on sales in the US - registered by RIAA) and in 2020 it was announced that the album was a 2021 inductee into the Grammy Hall of Fame. A Traditional Blues "Rude Mood" song, reproduced here quite brilliantly by Crest, offering a superb vocal by Scott!

Mainstream Figure: Promenade Half, Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru Pass Thru, Trade By, Star Thru, Square Thru Three, Swing and Promenade.

Designated Drinker ~ Dan Nordbye

Eureka EUR 1802 (Original Artists: Alan Jackson, George Strait)

A humoresque song from Alan Jackson's tenth studio album: "Drive" (released in 2002) that was written by Alan and included George Strait on the vocal; although this track was never released officially as a single, it achieved No.44 on the Billboard Top 100. The lyrics state that the singer is trying to get to "where he can't think of her". It is a clever piece of "Boom-Chuck" music, featuring Dan Nordbye on a first-class Vocal track!

Mainstream Figure: Promenade Half, Square Thru Four, Right and Left Thru Veer Left, Ferris Wheel, Square Thru Three, Swing and Promenade.

Ramblin Rose ~ Chris Froggatt Knee-Deep KDM 170 (Original Artist: Nat King Cole)

A 1962 "torch song" (a song where the lyrics tell of one person "Carrying a Torch" for the other) - written by brothers Noel Sherman (words) and Joe Sherman (music) and popularized by Nat King Cole whose recording reached No. 2 on the Billboard Hot 100 chart in 1962. Knee-Deep are excellent at producing music for this type of song and the instrumentation on this is a terrific example; Chris Froggatt - excels on the vocal!

Mainstream Figure: Heads Square Thru Four, With the Sides make a Right Hand Star, Heads Left Hand Star, Square Thru Four, Swing and Promenade.


